Activities and Strategies to Achieve Objective	 Parents are given information about the Title I, Part A program during Meet the Teachers Night before school begins in the fall. At that time, their involvement in activities throughout the year is solicited. The school district listens to parents' concerns and suggestions and attempts to respond in a positive manner, always keeping the best interest of the child at the forefront of decision-making. Communication between the home and school is vital for strong involvement, and the district provides various avenues for communication: Parents are encouraged to phone or personally contact their child's teacher or administrator; Progress reports, assessment reports, and report cards give information about student academic progress; Pertinent information to parents is shared through parent contact via teacher notes or telephone calls; Parents are contacted regarding any other areas where a one-on-one discussion is necessary.

Objective 4	Registration for Kindergarten is scheduled each April and in July for Pre-Kindergarten as a child's first formal experience in the public school setting. Since Denver City ISD is located in a rural area, the school is a central gathering spot within the community for family activities, and parents with preschool children do often attend school functions. Consequently, children are often familiar with school before enrolling in Pre-K or Kindergarten.
